We want to get both, teens and young adults, engaged in our digital zine. Teens can earn points toward the TSRC by submitting their creative work.



- **Program E: Ozobots** Participants will be using this kit to code their own star maps, leading their Ozobots on a journey through space.



#### **Passive Scavenger Hunt Program Idea**



Libraries are wonderful spaces for children to explore, learn, and grow. Inspired by the Didsbury Municipal Library, the Cochrane Public Library is excited to introduce a unique passive program idea that has been delighting young visitors for almost two years: our monthly scavenger hunt.

This engaging activity transforms each library visit into an adventure, encouraging children to explore and interact with their environment in fun and educational ways.

Each month, we introduce a new scavenger hunt theme. From Black History Month to Rodeo, Pride Month, and Indigenous History Month, our themes are carefully selected to be both educational and inclusive. The scavenger hunt is quite simple. We hide twelve colorful pictures throughout the library, ensuring that children explore different areas of our space to find them all. They use a scavenger hunt legend to track their discoveries and once completed, return it to the front desk with their name, age, and phone number.

While the primary reward is the fun and satisfaction of completing the hunt, participants also have a chance to win a larger prize. Completed forms are entered into a draw for a library book bag filled with a collection of high-quality donated books. The books are tailored to the child's age, as listed on the form.

By introducing a passive scavenger hunt, you can create an exciting, educational, and inclusive program that will keep children returning to your library month after month. It's a wonderful way to make the library fun and vibrant for young visitors while also gathering valuable program statistics.

#### **Marigold IT: Finding Solutions Together**



If your library needs a technical solution and you don't know where to start, don't hesitate to contact Marigold IT for support, advice, or assistance. The Strathmore Municipal Library's Director of Library Services, Rachel Dick-Hughes, did just that.

The Strathmore Municipal Library is a popular spot for local groups to meet. In a town with few large public spaces available for gatherings, the library's program room is frequently rented out both during and after library hours.

After-hours rentals require a library staff member to be "on call" in case of emergencies, issues, or questions about the program room. To facilitate this, Rachel needed an affordable solution that did not require her staff to give out personal contact details.

"I had a few parameters, and I started to search for options myself, but I quickly became overwhelmed," Rachel stated, "I struggled to find enough information about different options to make an informed comparison." At this point, she decided to take what she considered a "longshot" and contacted Marigold IT for assistance.

Marigold IT Specialist Steven Copland received Rachel's IT ticket. He didn't have a ready-made solution. However, he used his expertise, experience, and training to provide an overview of several options tailored to the library's needs, along with their approximate costs and pros and cons. Rachel plans to use this information to make a pitch to her library board at the end of May.

The proposed solution is intended to improve the safety and security of Strathmore Municipal Library staff members who administer the facility's program room.

"Steven's support has been incredibly helpful to me," Rachel said. "He gave me solid, reliable information. It seems over and above what I would expect from an IT department."



# **Indigenous Information**

#### **Powwow Etiquette**



Powwows are important cultural events and probably the easiest way to begin a relationship with your Indigenous neighbors – everyone is welcome to attend. Indigenous music and dance survive today because of brave people who kept the traditions alive despite the very real danger that these teachings represented. Residential schools, the last of which closed in 1996, were only one way that the church and the Canadian government tried to destroy Indigenous culture forever.

It only became legal to hold a powwow again in 1951, but even after that the schools worked very hard to discourage students from using their own language and taught that to take part in traditional activities was a sin. We are all very lucky that Indigenous knowledge survived.

While there are smaller Powwow events throughout the year, the Labour Day Classic takes place in Mînî Thnî on the long weekend in September. These events will be ongoing for two days and competitors come from many nations. It will begin with the grand entry, which I consider a must see, followed by dance competitions in all age categories from tiny tots to elders.

Chairs near the dance floor are set aside for elders and any chair that has a blanket over the back has already been claimed.

I can think of no reason for a spectator to enter the dance area but if you need to go down to the front to perhaps say hello to someone, please do not walk across, enter and leave by the exit on the east side of the circle.

The music and regalia (not costumes) are exciting to us but are sacred items to the participants. They take hundreds of hours to make and are often family heirlooms. It is natural to want to take pictures and that is generally allowed during the competitions, but it is important to ask permission before taking pictures off the dance floor. Should you see a piece of regalia on the floor do not pick it up yourself, there are protocols that must be followed.



The arena director is the leader of the dance arbor, circle or arena. That lead position is designated to a person who has knowledge of the powwow arena. The AD sets the dance in motion and "directs traffic" so to speak.

The drums and singers are essential to the powwow. The music is powerful and beautiful. The songs are passed down through the generations as well as recently composed songs. Drum groups consist of families and friends. It is said that the drumbeats are related to the thunder and some consider them heartbeat of mother earth (Ina Makoche).

Women's traditional dance regalia is less colorful than that used for fancy or jingle dancing but extremely beautiful. It is made from more traditional materials such as buckskin. Beads, bones, shells, and porcupine quills are used to decorate heavy breastplates, neck pieces, medallions, leggings, moccasins, and bags which are required for this dance. It can take many years to complete a traditional women's regalia. The dress alone can weigh ten kilos and each heavily beaded added component adds to that. The movement of this dance is much more subtle.

The Emcee or lyapaha brings the powwow to life, they are sharp and witty, able to think on their feet and have knowledge of songs and dance. They have a good sense of humor as well!
